Nigeria: denouncing oil pollution

Our partner **Health of Mother Earth Foundation (HOMEF)** works on issues of climate justice, food sovereignty and oil pollution. HOMEF defends farmers' rights and helps protect their lands from pollution and contamination by the oil industry in southern Nigeria.

"After more than six decades of reckless, mindless, irresponsible, oil and gas extraction, communities are struggling for survival. It's about regaining land for farming; it's about getting clean water for fishing and for potable use; it's about regaining their dignity. It's a struggle for the right to life."

"In the past, farming was easy. My mother was a farmer. She used to have good harvests of cassava, cocoyam and plantain. Now on our farm, the cassava is dying. When we uproot it, we notice the sheen of oil. We face health challenges; houses filled with cracks from extractive activities; and a poor water system, among many other challenges."

"I rented a farm around here. For several months, it has been flooded and filled with oil. The cassava from here can't be used for anything. I am a widow with children to take care of. To date, no environmental remediation has been done.

I can't feed my children anymore."

HOMEF at a glance

ESTABLISHED: 2011

MISSION:

To support healthy, cohesive social-ecological communities where people live in solidarity and dignity.

IMPACT:

3,000+ people empowered to expose and denounce the adverse impacts of extractive activities on their livelihoods.

"This cassava has been planted for over a year, but there has been no yield, and now the roots have decayed in the soil.

When the river overflows due to poor drainage, it affects the farm. When the water leaves, the oil remains on the farmland. I had the hope of making a profit from the farm, but it was to no avail. Our aquatic life is gone. I wonder what will happen for the generations to come."

Indonesia: training next-generation farmers

Our partner **PAYOPAYO**¹ encourages village communities to work together to find solutions to common challenges related to agriculture, food, energy, natural resource management and youth engagement.

"The main problem faced by the rural community nowadays in Indonesia is the rural de-agrarianization process, where agriculture is increasingly abandoned and youths migrate to the city. Agriculture is becoming an ageing sector."

"At the PAYOPAYO youth farming field school, in addition to farming, we learn about rural entrepreneurship. My hope for the future is that people in my village are aware that agriculture should be sustainable and that it is not only an old people's job, but that it can also be done by youth and women."

¹Payopayo means "scarecrow" in the Mandar language. The scarecrow, a protector of crops, is a symbol of friendship with farming communities.

Bolivia: supporting Indigenous and farming communities

To enhance rural Indigenous farming families' living conditions, our partner *Fundación Nuna Bolivia* (NUNA²) supports agroecology projects that improve food sovereignty and environmental conservation. NUNA also supports food processing ventures, like cheese, yogurt and ice cream manufacturing, that increase and diversify family incomes.

"We encourage local development, because in the communities where we work, there is the problem of men—youths and adults—migrating permanently from the countryside to the city, because there are no local opportunities for work and income generation."

MISSION:

To ensure village sovereignty, in terms of both food and energy, so that farming communities can lead more just, dignified and sustainable lives.

IMPACT:

55,000 people in 25 villages reached by 250 young community organizers.

NUNA at a glance

ESTABLISHED:

2009

MISSION:

To contribute to the economic, political, social and cultural development of each individual, building fair and equitable relationships to preserve life and nature.

IMPACT:

779 people reached directly through agriculture, livestock-rearing and food processing projects.
